



Prime Minister unveils masterplan to end injustice and help ALL Brits get on in life

Schools, hospitals and the criminal justice system will be under the spotlight and findings will be published next year

THERESA May has ordered a full review of how disadvantaged Brits are treated by public services in a bid to tackle injustice.

The PM has demanded the root-and-branch audit of schools, hospitals, welfare and the criminal justice system.

She wants to stamp out racism, discrimination and inequality affecting striving ethnic minorities and the white working class.

[Mrs May](#) vowed to shine a light on how people from different backgrounds receive health, education and employment services across the country.

In an unprecedented move, she will order Whitehall officials to publish the findings by next summer.

Disadvantaged white working-class people in poor coastal towns and black and ethnic minority groups in inner cities will see how their race and background affect services they receive.

Information such as the likelihood of being tasered by cops depending on race will be included in the audit.

It follows [Mrs May](#)'s inaugural speech at No10 when she vowed to govern for hard-working Brits striving to make ends meet.

The news came as figures show that those from a Black Caribbean background are three times as likely to be permanently excluded from school than their peers.

White working-class boys are less likely to go to university than any other group.

[Mrs May](#) said: “This audit will reveal difficult truths, but we should not be apologetic about shining a light on injustices as never before.

“It is only by doing so that we can make this country work for everyone, not just a privileged few.”

Critics say that, at a time when teachers and nurses working in schools and hospitals are already under pressure, the audit will pile more strain on the system.
